Highlights Key

PINK- examples of figurative language. You should mark a minimum of one per chapter:

- **Simile**: a figure of speech that uses “like” or “as” to compare two unlike subjects
- **Metaphor**: a figure of speech in which a comparison is made without the use of “like” or “as”
- **Personification**: a type of figurative language in which a non-human subject is given human characteristics
- **Hyperbole**: an exaggerated statement not meant to be taken literally, but to prove a point (example: “I could eat a horse!”)
- **Onomatopoeia**: a word that sounds like the noise it describes

BLUE- any words that you don’t know. Write the definitions in the margins.

YELLOW- examples in the book that model Trinity School’s mission: to nurture children in a God-centered environment, filling hearts and minds with a passion for learning, a strong moral foundation, a commitment to social responsibility, and respect for all people.

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
